VVomen's Protection





Many people in the world have experienced sexual mistreatment, or assault, but most of these people are women of color and young girls. When these actions occur they can happen at any time and at any moment. Due to low protection for women, the systems in place do not make much impact because of the inequality between women and men.

In Chicago, within a four year time period, there were 6,084 reported cases of sexual assault. How were these handled? From NBC Chicago, there was a survivor who spoke out to the public about how these charges are being handled in the Chicago Police Department and how she handled the situation without the help of CPD. The overall arrest rate for these Chicago cases is 12.75%. Chicago Alliance Against Sexual Exploitation states, "Many rape cases end with no charges", so this organization works to help victims figure out their way through the criminal justice system.

Assault can occur at any time, and at any moment. A lot of people think it can only happen at night, and in dangerous alleys, but assault often happens under the victim's roof. After all of this occurs, the victim might not want to tell what went on because of many reasons—reliving trauma, fear of retaliation, fear of not being believed, etc. So it is important to protect our women because if these things occur, and no one takes action, what will happen?

No one seems to have the answers to these questions. It makes me wonder when women's voices are going to be loud enough for people to hear them.
